The mission of the ATI/Reentry Coalition

is to reduce crime, strengthen families, and bring hope and opportunity to New York City's most troubled communities by providing a full spectrum of services for individuals involved in the criminal justice system.

Although incarceration has long been the primary response to crime, it is incredibly expensive and often fails to improve public safety and prevent future crimes committed by people released from jail or prison. The ATI/Reentry Coalition enables New York City to reduce crime and break the cycle of incarceration while saving tax dollars and strengthening communities.

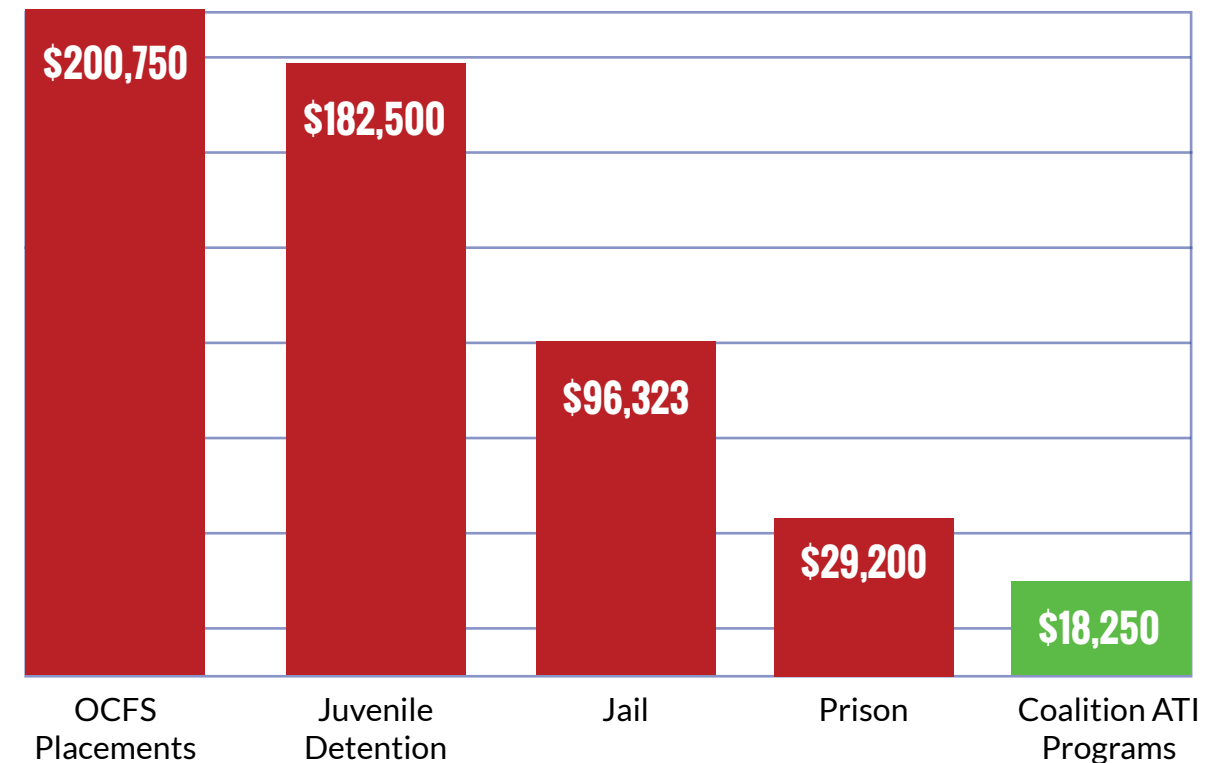

This publication describes ATI/Reentry Coalition programs that received funding from the City Council in FY 2014.

PUBLIC SAVINGS, PUBLIC SAFETY

ATI (alternative-to-incarceration) and reentry programming costs far less than prison, jail, juvenile placement, and juvenile detention. Further, the two-year recidivism rate of Coalition program graduates is **less than 20%**, far lower than the 42% recidivism rate of those released from incarceration.

ATI/REENTRY COALITION SERVICES

Youth Services

The Coalition provides positive youth development services that are strengths-based and promote goal setting and leadership development through an emphasis on youth empowerment, positive relationships with adults, and skill-building in the transition from youth to independent adulthood.

Women's Services

ATI/Reentry programs offer gender-specific services including jail- and prison-based education, pre-release services, family reunification assistance, family support services, reentry case management, and other targeted assistance and support.

Substance Abuse Services

ATI/Reentry programs provide clinical screening and assessment, treatment, and referrals to treatment at community-based providers for persons with substance abuse and dependence.

Mental Health Services

ATI/Reentry programs provide court-based mental health screenings conducted by clinical staff, assessment, mental health treatment, service planning, service referrals, and escorts to community mental health treatment centers.

Education Services

ATI/Reentry programs provide literacy classes, high school equivalency prep classes, tutoring, health and HIV/AIDS prevention education, and college and career planning.

Employment Services

ATI/Reentry programs provide pre-employment job readiness training, paid transitional work, job placement services, post-placement support, career planning, and industry-specific training that promotes wage growth and career advancement.

Family Services

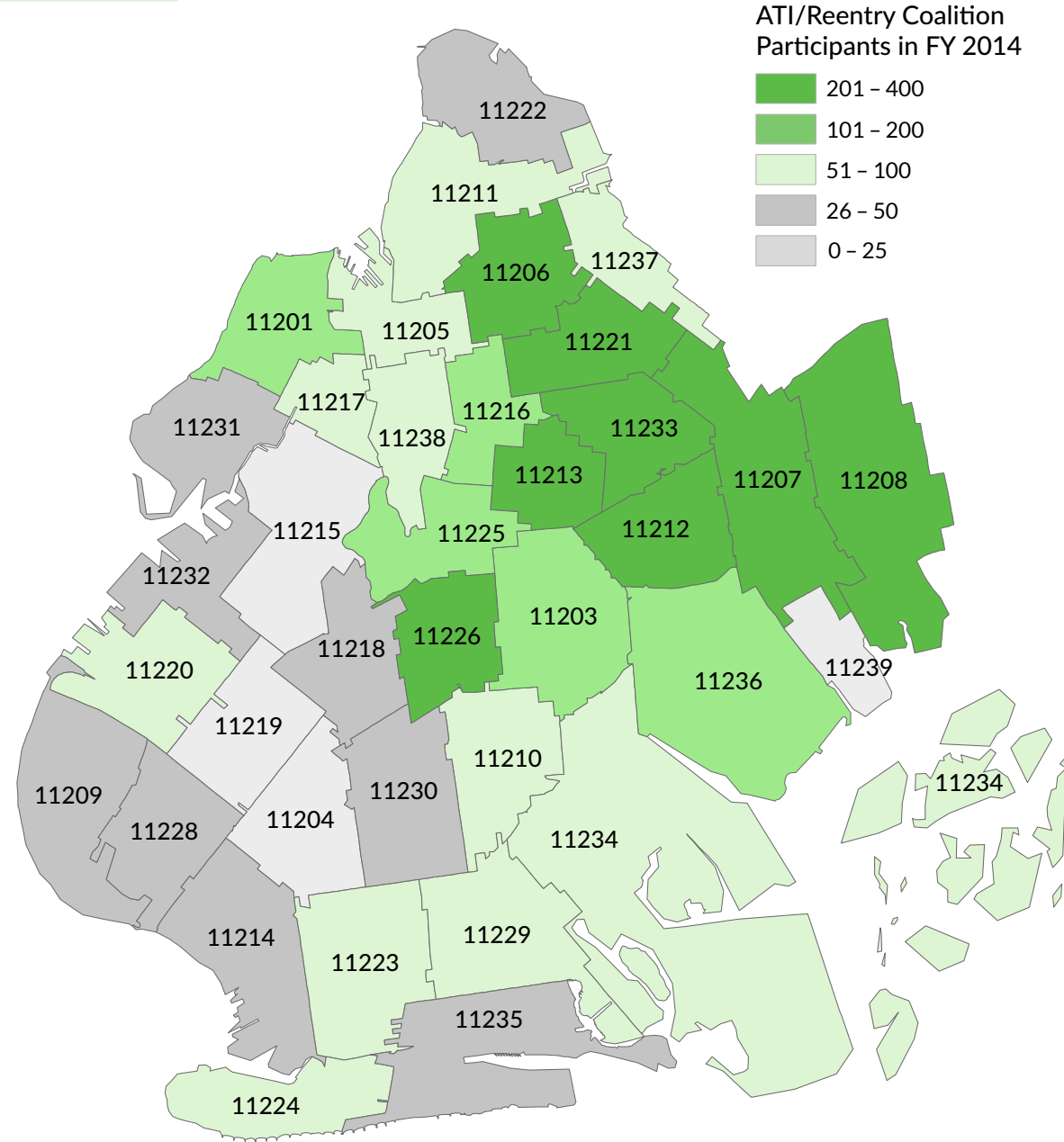
ATI/Reentry programs offer a broad range of family services, including case management, parenting education, family reunification and preservation services, crisis intervention, and child support services.

Housing Services

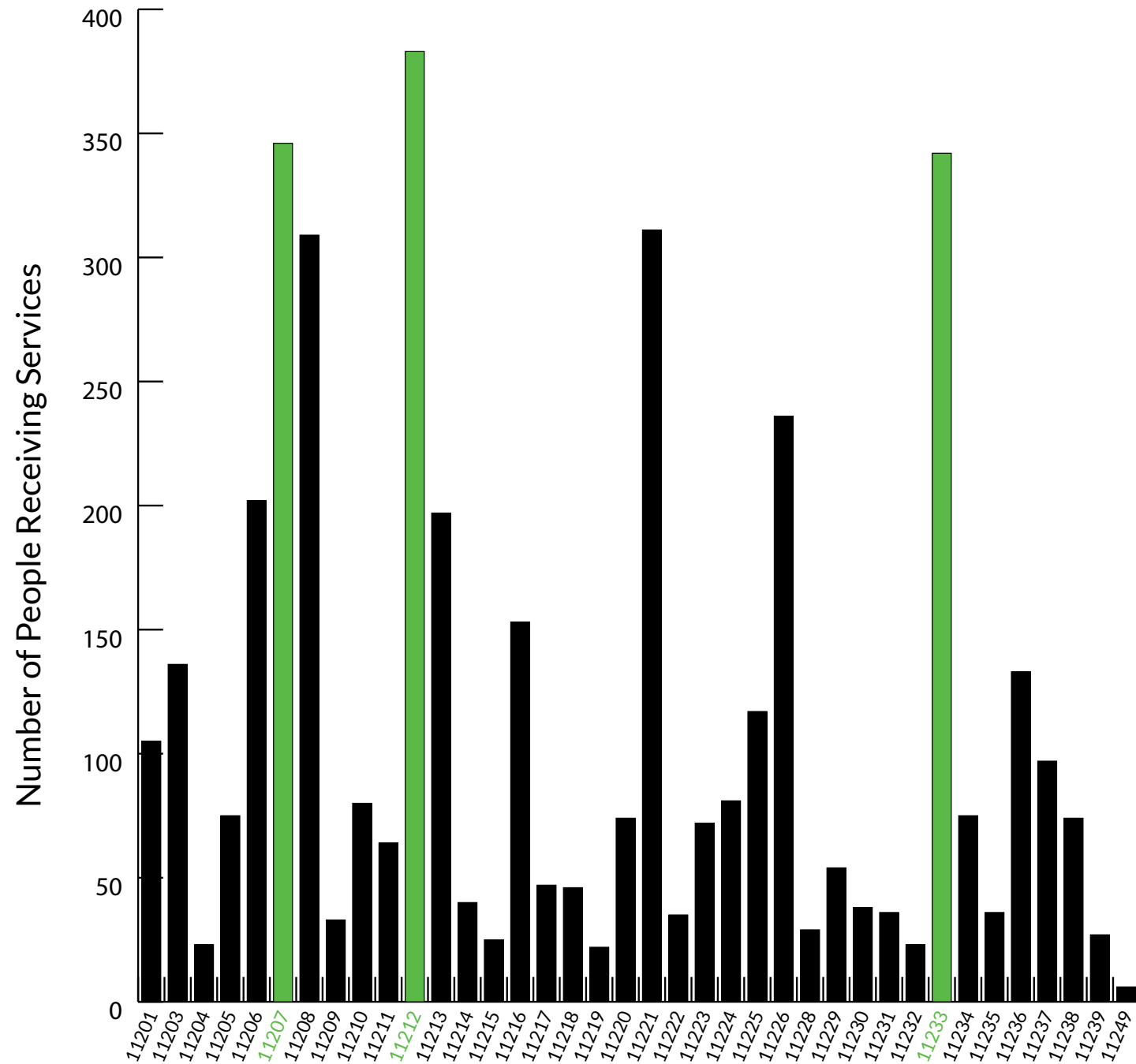
ATI/Reentry programs offer emergency, temporary, and long-term housing. Coalition members develop relationships with landlords and management companies to identify safe, affordable apartments for clients and provide independent living skills training.

Legal Services

Program staff work with the courts, parole, and probation to support successful case outcomes. ATI/Reentry programs help individuals overcome legal barriers by correcting criminal record errors, fighting employment discrimination, and providing representation at housing eviction proceedings.

WHAT'S NEW

ATI/Reentry Coalition Agencies FY 2014-2015

CASES

In 2014, CASES relocated to new offices in

CENTRAL HARLEM & DOWNTOWN BROOKLYN

and now provides ATI/Reentry services at seven locations across the five boroughs including Bedford-Stuyvesant, Jamaica, the South Bronx, and Staten Island.

*In October 2014, CASES opened the State-licensed **Nathaniel Mental Health Clinic** providing outpatient treatment services targeted to court-involved youth and adults who have serious mental illness.*

Center for Employment Opportunity (CEO)

CEO's evidenced based model combines job-readiness training, paid transitional work, full-time job placement assistance, and post placement services exclusively to individuals with criminal records.

In 2014, CEO served

2,272

individuals returning home to NYC communities

— and —

placed

952

individuals into full-time employment.

Center for Community Alternatives (CCA)

In 2014, CCA's Family Court Client Specific Planning introduced an evidence-based trauma therapy intervention to youth in the program.

More than 80%

of its participants showed improvement with school and family relationships and avoided re-arrest.

Of the women enrolled in CCA's Crossroads substance abuse treatment program, **87%** avoided re-arrest during the program year.

EAC Network - NYC TASC & Mental Health Programs

In 2014, EAC connected over

1,800

men and women to substance abuse and/or mental health treatment.

EAC's NYC TASC programs provides assessment, treatment planning, referrals to treatment, case management and wraparound services to individuals with behavioral health issues in Brooklyn, the Bronx, Queens, and Staten Island.

Legal Action Center (LAC)

To help justice-involved individuals build and rebuild their lives, in 2014 LAC staff advised NYC agencies and policymakers on how to help men and women gain Medicaid coverage and access to comprehensive health care.

helped **1,400** NYC residents with criminal records secure employment, health care, housing, and other essentials by resolving over **2,300** civil legal cases.

Osborne Association

In 2014, Osborne's Court Advocacy Services (CAS) provided more than

2,300

youth and adults on Rikers Island with cognitive behavioral therapy, reentry planning and support, employment readiness, family reunification, and connections to support services in the community.

*In 2015, Osborne began an **18-month redevelopment process** that will create jobs and opportunities in the heart of the Bronx by transforming a closed prison into a welcoming reentry center for individuals returning home from New York's jails and prisons.*

Women's Prison Association (WPA)

In 2014, WPA launched **JusticeHome**, an innovative ATI program for women which provides intensive home-based services, individualized case planning, and cognitive behavioral programming to women facing six months or longer in prison or jail.

Clients with substance abuse issues spanning decades have achieved and maintained sobriety by learning to harness their personal strengths and community resources, and mothers in WPA's programs have built critical parenting skills through participation in in-house workshops.

YOUTH IN THE JUSTICE SYSTEM

Young adults (age 12–24) who enter the criminal justice system face unique challenges. Without special attention, court-involved youth risk cycling in and out of the justice system for the rest of their lives. The ATI/Reentry Coalition offers specialized youth development services in order to help these young people achieve a sustainable, crime-free life.

*With City Council support, the ATI/Reentry Coalition provided services to more than **3,600** court-involved youth, ages 24 and younger, in FY 2014.*

WOMEN IN THE JUSTICE SYSTEM

For many women, the path to court-involvement includes a history of victimization, mood and anxiety disorders, mental illness, and self-medicating/substance-abusing behaviors. However, prevailing policies, programs, and assessment tools primarily focus on the risks and needs of males. The ATI/Reentry Coalition provides many gender-responsive services to meet the special needs of justice-involved women.

*With City Council support, the ATI/Reentry Coalition provided services to more than **2,400** court-involved women in FY 2014.*

The City Council has been supporting ATI/Reentry programs for the last 17 years.

With Council support, Coalition members have improved public safety by helping youth and adults to end their involvement with the criminal justice system, address behavioral health and other challenges, and build a productive life in the community. Every year, participants in ATI/Reentry Coalition programs:

- Earn educational credentials including high school equivalency diplomas
- Begin college
- Complete job training and secure employment
- Obtain appropriate public benefits and assistance including health insurance
- Reconnect and/or establish stronger relationships with family members
- Secure stable housing
- Complete substance use treatment and achieve abstinence
- Access effective mental health treatment services in the community
- Complete community service projects
- Engage in ongoing services at community-based providers to ensure long-term stability and success
- Fulfill obligations to the Court and thereby avoid incarceration
- Avoid recidivism
